Clinic Renovations to Improve Safety for Patients

In our December 2015 issue, we reported that a clinic in Da-ying, Shaanxi Province was in need of renovation. The clinic was in service for many years, but due to the lack of maintenance, it became dilapidated and potentially hazardous. With your generosity, the required funds were raised for the job. Below is an extract of a letter of appreciation from the sisters who operate the clinic:

A water conduit was put in place and the water pipes properly installed, the leakage problem was then fixed; improvements to electrical wiring now guarantee a reliable supply of electricity; a new coat of paint has been applied to the building, walls, doors, windows, and handrails.

Business of Enzymes leads to Self-sufficiency for an Elderly Home

Ren-ai Old Folks Home is in Erlianhaote, Inner Mongolia. It has been providing shelters and home visit service, free of charge, to old folks who are handicapped and with no family support. The sisters running the home had to rely on charitable donations. Caritas-HK helped them with donated materials and guidance. Lately, the sisters also joined Caritas-HK's matching fund scheme, learning to raise funds systematically in the local community. Still they needed to look for other sources of income to meet their ever increasing financial commitments.



They found an innovative way to generate revenue. They researched, experimented, and came up with a range of marketable enzymes products made from fruits and vegetables. With help from Caritas-HK they bought a minivan to deliver the products to customers. It is truly exciting - they are on their way to become financially self-sufficient!

Promotional activities have been carried out. Many orders from restaurants and friends were received, with excellent reviews. More than 5,000 yuan have been generated since its introduction half a year ago. The plan is to submit the products for government approval prior to the end of this year. When the products are officially approved, the next step is to file for QS (Quality Safety) designation. We are happy to see the progress that the sisters have made.



Call from Affar ...

Dear officer-in-charge,

We are a group of religious sisters from Baotou in Inner Mongolia. We serve in a rural community where many of the young people left and worked in big cities, leaving behind a lot of elderly folks who lack care and support from family members. These old folks often feel lonely and depressed. They live off their meager savings, and sometimes limited subsidies from their children. The majority do not receive old age support from the government. Their quality of life and the state of their health are truly worrisome.



Care services for elderly



We organized ourselves into a group of volunteers three years ago to help them. Each month we visit and provide them with various services such as washing bedsheets and clothes, shampooing and cutting hair, cutting nails; simple medical checkups such as measuring blood pressure and blood sugar. For the particularly needy, we provided some basic necessities such as foodstuff and clothing. Most of all, however our visits let them know they are loved, and people care about them. At present there are 30 people in our core group, plus another 30 who join and spread out in different locales. We have scheduled services for old folks in 6 villages around Baotou, serving more than 100 left-behind elderly folks.

A lack of resources is our biggest challenge. We have shortage of food, common household commodities, clothing, as well as the lack of reliable means of transportation. We also have difficulty providing extra help for the special needy. Because the villages are scattered in mountainous areas, it is necessary to hire vehicles to deliver the provisions. To save money we sometimes ask for help from parishioners who farm and have used tricycles, which becomes a problem during planting or harvesting seasons as they aren't readily available when needed. In winter, it becomes dangerous during or after heavy snow falls, or sandstorms.

We have been doing regular fund raising in our parish, but it is not enough to meet the needs of the elderly we care for.
